


Growing the New Generation


The cultural centre of Canada, Montreal, is known for its international population. With such a diverse community, food connects individuals from all over, creating a universal language.

Looking towards the future not only in Montreal, but globally, food is becoming a dwindling resource. Cities will have no option but to address this issue. In our proposal we have laid out a sustainable system for feeding the city through these islands, While growing a new generation that has a greater connection to food. We plan to implement urban farms onto the islands that will take the forms, outdoor and indoor. These islands will become the heart of Montreal, through fueling its population. Tere are great social, environmental, economical and health benefits that are resultant of urban agriculture. The organizing principle in our design is Plant, grow ,prepare, share and eat, which is applied at both macro and micro scales, that being the city and community, which func tions pragmatically and metaphorically. Our cycle describes a series of actions associated with the production and distribution of food. The islands provide an environment in which the system can be carreid out successfully where at any moment in time we are performing one of these actions and become relationally connected to others. At the Mi cro scale, we provide community gardens, open to all individuals, where the can engage in planting, growing, preparing, sharing and eating at any stage and in any order. All food planted is communal and there for the use of all indivduals. The community gardens are located on the Olympic Bassin, in a series of floating pathways and floating growing beds which leads to a communal kitchen and feeding area. This meeting place will foster meaningful relationships through food. At the macro scale, our urban farm operates on the same design principles, feeding the entire populatin of Monreal. Food grown on these farms will be distributed to local grocery stores. These islands will contrast the dense urban life by providing an agro-communitarian system for a utopian society.


